The bridge from Dheisheh Refugee Camp to Doha City. The only bridge built by Palestinians in Area C, it connects the camp to the entirely new, refugee-inhabited municipality of Doha. Not only the physical link between the camp and its expansion, the bridge also marks the absolute centrality of the camp for the refugee community living beyond its borders.



### **NEW IMAGINARIES**



Dhehesheh Refugee Camp (1955) and Doha City (2012) – photomontage: BraveNewAlps (Campus in Camps) 2012

This image was produced by juxtaposing and overlapping a picture taken in 1955 (left side) and a picture taken in 2012 (right side). The left side shows Dheisheh Refugee Camp made of tents in 1955, while the right side presents Doha City, a neighborhood lying outside the camp borders and built by Palestinian refugees. Doha was named in honour of the capital of Qatar, the country which partially financed its construction. It is a refugee city that works virtually as an independent municipality, yet remains physically and politically linked to the Dheisheh via a bridge and social networks respectively.

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
